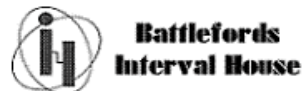

Denise holds a Diploma in Business Management from Capilano University, an Instructor's Certificate from the Justice Institute, and a BC Provincial Instructors Diploma from VCC. She is one of few First Nations Certified Professional Coaches in Canada, is certified through the Coaches Training Institute (CTI), and has advanced training in Systems Coaching. Denise is currently studying Process Psychology as it applies to relationships and groups navigating change and experiencing conflict with Dr. Stephen Schuiteveorder (www.processingconsulting.org) as her mentor. Denise is also studying Dr. Gordon Neufeld's Attachment Based Developmental Psychology in order to understand the role of attachment in healing communities.



Denise was born and raised in North Vancouver to a mother of European decent, and a father of Coast Salish and Tsimshian heritage. She currently resides in West Vancouver on the Capilano reserve with her husband Jay, her sons Jake and Max, and their dog Heidi and cats Marshmallow and Buster, where they enjoy life in their community. Denise feels lucky to have such a beautiful family and grateful that she is able to share her life with them

The majority of Denise's journey has included work in First Nations communities throughout BC, including her own community The Squamish Nation. She founded Chameleon Strategies in 2003 and created the groundbreaking transformational workshop on Lateral Violence, The Crab In the Bucket. Due to a high level of commitment to her own and her clients' growth, Denise has excelled in the areas of personal and organizational development. Denise is passionate about facilitating and building the capacity of groups during times of change and believes people have the innate ability to flourish regardless of circumstances. Whether working with individuals, relationships, teams or communities, her goal is to increase the client's capacity to transcend self-imposed limitations. To elicit existing creativity, skills, and potential from within each client, Denise uses her gifts of intuition, directness and insight in combination with her unique ability as a professional coach and facilitator. Her approach goes beyond routine problem solving models and leads clients to source their own wisdom and creativity. Clients discover and implement their own solutions leading to sustainable change that is meaningful.

Workshop Description

During this 1-day experiential workshop Denise will gently guide participants through a variety of exercises that explores the importance of attachments on our development during childhood and throughout adulthood. Together we will unfold the link between attachment and resiliency in the face of a world that wounds how our wholeness can be restored through strong healthy relationships.

Participants of this workshop will....

- Explore our evolution and ability to overcome trauma through a development lens;
- Identify the roots of anxiety and alarm;
- Reflect on events that cause development stuck-nests and how to become unstuck;
- Discuss the importance of healthy relationships as they relate to building resiliency; and
- Practice using tools that increase self-awareness and promote healing.
